The study found that universities are incorporating language training into their curricula, often offering courses in English, Chinese, and other major languages. Educators noted that multilingual skills enable students to communicate effectively in diverse work environments and access a broader range of professional opportunities.

# c. Challenges of Resource Allocation and Faculty Expertise

Limited resources and faculty expertise were identified as significant barriers to implementing a globalized curriculum. Many participants noted that while there is enthusiasm for integrating global perspectives, a lack of faculty training and funding for international programs can hinder progress. As a result, some universities struggle to offer comprehensive global education to their students.

### d. Need for Balance Between Local and Global Content

The study found that balancing local relevance with global perspectives is a challenge for curriculum developers. Participants expressed concerns about maintaining cultural identity and values while incorporating international topics. Some universities have addressed this challenge by designing curricula that include courses on local history and culture alongside global issues, allowing students to appreciate their heritage while gaining global competencies.

#### 5. DISCUSSION

The findings highlight both the opportunities and challenges associated with curriculum development in a globalized context. One of the primary opportunities lies in preparing students for the global workforce, where intercultural communication and an understanding of global issues are increasingly valued. Courses that incorporate global perspectives can enhance students' employability, critical thinking, and adaptability, making them better equipped to navigate the complexities of modern professional environments.

However, the challenges of resource allocation, faculty expertise, and balancing local and global perspectives remain significant barriers to achieving a fully globalized curriculum. Additionally, the incorporation of digital learning resources and online courses can help expand access to global content, particularly for institutions with limited resources.

This balanced approach allows students to develop a deeper understanding of their own culture and values, which in turn enables them to engage meaningfully with individuals from other cultural backgrounds.
